MINI-CHECK – CAN I DO THIS YET?

- ☐ I listen to the last sound of the base verb, not the last letter.
- ☐ After a voiceless final sound, I pronounce -ed as /t/ and add no extra syllable.
- ☐ After a voiced final sound, I pronounce -ed as /d/ and keep it buzzing to the end instead of devoicing it to /t/.
- ☐ Only after /t/ or /d/ do I pronounce the extra syllable /ɪd/; I do not transfer the syllables from German arbeitete or spielte to other English verbs.

Not every box ticked? Say the three groups slowly once more and try this sheet again tomorrow.

Check only when you have finished. Every answer comes with the **why** — the rule matters more than the result.
