- ☐ I use have got with I, you, we, they and has got with he, she, it.
- ☐ I build the question by inversion: "Have you got ...?" — with no do at all.
- ☐ I form the negative with not: "I haven't got ..." and "She hasn't got ..."
- ☐ In short answers I repeat have/has: "Yes, I have." — and I know that 's in "She's got ..." stands for has.

Not every box ticked? Build the lesson once more and try this sheet again tomorrow.
