- ☐ I can build the form reliably: have/has + been + the -ing form of the verb.
- ☐ I never translate German present + "seit" with the English present: "I've been working on the quote since Monday."
- ☐ For goes before a span of time, since before a starting point: "for two weeks", "since Tuesday".
- ☐ State verbs like know, be, and like stay in the simple: "I've known my mentor since my internship."

Check only when you have finished. Every answer comes with the **why** — the rule matters more than the result.

<i>"Five" counts a finished result — a quantity calls for the simple.</i></p> <p>03 She's been calling suppliers since nine o'clock.
<i>"Since nine" plus activity up to now → continuous.</i></p> <p>04 She's called three suppliers today.
<i>"Three" counts results — simple.</i></p> <p>05 I've been drafting the workshop handouts all afternoon.
<i>"All afternoon" describes the time spent, not a result.</i></p> | <p>06 I've finished the handouts for the workshop.

<i>In a question have moves before the subject; "you" takes have.</i></p> <p>02 She has been travelling
<i>Third person singular → has.</i></p> <p>03 chasing this invoice since Tuesday

<i>"Six weeks" is a span of time → for.</i></p> | <p>05 I have been interviewing

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| <p>01 I have been working on this project since January.
<i>Never use the present for a duration up to now: German "seit" + present becomes the present perfect continuous in English.</i></p> <p>02 We've been using this tool for two years.
<i>"Two years" is a span → for; since only introduces a starting point.</i></p> <p>03 We've known the auditors for years.
<i>"Know" is a state verb and does not take the continuous.</i></p> | <p>04 They have been updating the pricing page all week.
<i>Without been the chain is broken: have/has + been + -ing.</i></p> <p>05 I've sent four quotes this morning.
<i>"Four quotes" counts finished results — quantities need the simple.</i></p> <p>06 The system has been crashing every morning this week.
<i>Been is always followed by the -ing form.</i></p> |

<i>Duration up to now; "since Monday" names the starting point.

<i>"All week" = duration, activity in focus.</i></p> | <p>03 "Sorry, I'm late — I've been fixing the printer."
<i>A just-finished activity explains the lateness — fresh traces.</i></p> <p>04 "How long have you been leading the stand-up?"
