MINI-CHECK — CAN I DO THIS YET?

- ☐ I form the present perfect with have/has + past participle: "I have finished."
- ☐ I use since/for for periods that last up to now: "since March", "for six months".
- ☐ I spot finished-time words (yesterday, last week, ago) and switch to the past simple.
- ☐ I place just/already/never between the auxiliary and the participle, and I know the difference between "been to" and "gone to".

Check only when you have finished. Every answer comes with the **why** — the rule matters more than the result.
