BRICK 1 · SORTING

01 **Subjekt - Pronomen bleibt** - the engineer who designed the dashboard

Who is the subject of designed and cannot be omitted.

02 **Subjekt - Pronomen bleibt** - the dashboard which tracks response times

Which is the subject of tracks and must remain.

03 **Subjekt - Pronomen bleibt** - the analyst that prepared the forecast

That performs the subject role before prepared.

04 **Subjekt - Pronomen bleibt** - the tool that exports the data

That is the subject of exports.

05 **Subjekt - Pronomen bleibt** - the consultant who knows the market

Who stands as the subject before knows.

06 **Objekt - Pronomen kann weg** - the email (that) I forwarded

I is the subject; that is the object and can be omitted.

07 **Objekt - Pronomen kann weg** - the candidate (who) we interviewed

We is the subject; who is the object and can be omitted.

08 **Objekt - Pronomen kann weg** - the software (which) the team selected

The team is the subject; which is the object and can be omitted.

09 **Objekt - Pronomen kann weg** - the venue (that) Sara booked

Sara is the subject; that is the omissible object.

10 **Objekt - Pronomen kann weg** - the checklist (which) you shared

You is the subject; which can be omitted as the object.

Who refers to the person and is the subject of maintains.

Which refers to the thing and is the subject of sits.

We is the subject; the object pronoun can be omitted.

You is the subject; the pronoun would only be the object.

07 The app **which** crashed twice has been replaced.

Which refers to the thing and is the subject of crashed.

08 The documents **[no pronoun]** Leo scanned are in this folder.

Leo is the subject; the object pronoun can be omitted.

BRICK 3 · CORRECT

01 The trainer **who** leads the workshop is from Leeds.

Who refers to a person; which refers to things.

02 We use a scanner **which** reads damaged labels.

Which refers to the thing; who refers to people.

03 The laptop **that I ordered** arrived this morning.

Defining information stays beside the noun without commas.

04 The assistant **who** works upstairs helped me with the booking.

The relative clause needs who as the subject of works.

05 The supplier **that we contacted** replied immediately.

The object is already represented by that, so him is not added.

06 The form **that** you need is available online.

That refers directly back to form; what cannot do that here.

I is the subject; the object pronoun can be omitted.
