<i>The plan has existed for weeks — a clear intention marker.</i></p> | <p>06 Beweismarker Look at the queue
<i>"Look at" points to something visible right now.</i></p> <p>07 Beweismarker watch out for the delay
<i>"Watch out" warns based on a visible sign.</i></p> <p>08 Beweismarker look at those figures
<i>The figures are visibly in front of you — an evidence marker.</i></p> <p>09 Beweismarker watch the numbers fall
<i>"Watch" points to a visible trend.</i></p> <p>10 Beweismarker look at this graph

<i>"To" is followed by the base form, not the -ing form.</i></p> | <p>04 We already decided — I'm going to send the invoice tomorrow.
<i>"We already decided" reveals an earlier decision — so going to, not will.</i></p> <p>05 Watch out — you're going to trip over that cable!
<i>The auxiliary "are" is missing after the subject — going to needs am/is/are.</i></p> <p>06 The phone is ringing — I'll answer it.
<i>A decision made at that very moment is spontaneous — that is will, not going to.</i></p> |
