MINI-CHECK — CAN I DO THIS YET?

- ☐ I can spot the present perfect signal words: already, just, yet, ever, never, for, since, recently, so far, this week.
- ☐ I know that yesterday, ago, last week and in 2019 are finished time — they take the past simple.
- ☐ I tell since (starting point: "since 2019") and for (duration: "for three years") apart.
- ☐ I put yet at the end and already mid-sentence: "I haven't replied yet."

Check only when you have finished. Every answer comes with the **why** — the rule matters more than the result.
