03 A colleague in the corridor says "How's it going?" — answer short and positive and return the question.

04 Networking break: the person next to you has just mentioned they work in marketing. Ask an open follow-up.

MINI-CHECK — CAN I DO THIS YET?

- ☐ I can open a conversation with a light question that anyone in the room can answer.
- ☐ I answer "How are you?" short and positive and return the question: "Good, thanks. And you?"
- ☐ I keep the conversation going with open questions (what/how/why) instead of yes/no questions.
- ☐ I know safe topics (weather, travel, projects) and taboo topics (salary, politics, age).

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| <p>01 What's the weather like in Dublin?
<i>"What ... like?" asks for a description — with "like" only "what" fits.</i></p> <p>02 And you?
<i>The return question is "And you?" — that's how the ball goes back.</i></p> <p>03 Is this your first time in Munich?
<i>First-time question: "Is this your first time ...?" — a yes/no question starting with "is".</i></p> <p>04 How do you know Thomas?
<i>"How do you know ...?" asks about the connection — question word + do + subject + verb.</i></p> | <p>05 What kind of music do you like?
<i>"What kind of ...?" asks about the type.</i></p> <p>06 Did you enjoy the workshop yesterday?
<i>"Yesterday" calls for the past: "did".</i></p> <p>07 How long have you lived in Frankfurt?
<i>"How long ...?" asks about duration.</i></p> <p>08 What did you think of the keynote?
<i>"What did you think of ...?" asks for an opinion.</i></p> |
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BRICK 3 · CORRECT

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| <p>01 Where do you work?
<i>Question word + do + subject + verb — without "do" it sounds like a German sentence.</i></p> <p>02 "How's it going?" — "It's going well, thanks."
<i>"It goes" is a word-for-word translation from German — the natural move is a short answer like "It's going well".</i></p> <p>03 "How are you?" — "Good, thanks. And you?"
<i>"How are you?" is a greeting, not a health survey — short, positive, return it.</i></p> | <p>04 Nice to meet you! What do you do?
<i>Salary is a taboo topic in small talk — ask about their job instead.</i></p> <p>05 What's your hotel like?
<i>Open questions with "what" invite a story — yes/no questions stop the rally.</i></p> <p>06 How are you, Mr. Henderson? Nice to finally meet you.
<i>At a first client meeting "How are you?" is the safe choice — "What's up?" suits colleagues.</i></p> |

Your lines may differ — just check: opened light? Answered short? Followed up openly?

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| <p>01 "Busy morning, Tom?"
<i>"Busy ...?" works on any day — light and guaranteed answerable.</i></p> <p>02 "How was the train journey, Aoife?"
<i>Ask visitors who have just arrived about their journey.</i></p> | <p>03 "Not bad, thanks — and you?"
<i>Short positive answer plus a return — the ball goes back.</i></p> <p>04 "What does your team work on?"
<i>Pick up the keyword "marketing" and ask openly — "what" invites a story.</i></p> |
