BRICK 1 · SORTING

01 **Move between slides** That brings me to the budget for the spring campaign.

"That brings me to" links you to the new slide.

02 **Point at a detail** The red bar on the right is last year's figure.

Colour plus place names one spot.

03 **Point at a detail** The percentage in the top right is our churn rate.

"In the top right" is a place phrase.

04 **Move between slides** Let's move on to the summary slide.

"Move on to" goes forward.

05 **Point at a detail** At the bottom of the slide you can see the sources.

"At the bottom of the slide" directs the eye.

06 **Move between slides** Could we go back to the previous slide?

"Go back to the previous slide" is the backward move.

07 **Move between slides** On the next slide I'll show you the timeline.

"On the next slide" announces the following slide.

08 **Point at a detail** The last point on this slide is the most important.

A counted bullet point is one place.

BRICK 2 · FILL-IN

01 **on** the slide

Content sits on the slide like on a sheet of paper.

02 **As you can see**

"As you can see" is a fixed phrase.

03 **as** you can see

German "wie" becomes "as" here, never "how".

04 Here **you** can see

After "here" the subject comes before the verb.

05 the third bullet **point**

Lines in a list are bullet points.

06 **move on to**

"On" belongs to the fixed verb "move on to".

07 the **previous** slide

The slide before is the previous slide.

08 **at** the bottom of the slide

An edge is a point, not a surface: at the bottom of.

BRICK 3 · CORRECT

01 **On** this slide you can see our new logo.

It is on the slide, not in the slide.

02 **As** you can see, the costs went down in August.

"Wie Sie sehen" is "as"; not "how".

03 Here **you can see** the two options for the launch.

English does not invert after "here".

04 Let's move on **to** the last slide of the deck.

"Move on to" needs the little "to".

05 The next **slide** shows our team in Berlin.

The page is a slide; "foil" is kitchen foil.

06 The delivery date **is** at the bottom of this slide.

German "steht" becomes "is" here.
